





They are not being performed merely to entertain, or to show off his divine power, or even to convince the skeptical. Nor does Jesus heal the sick and raise the dead simply because of his great compassion for those who suffer.

More than this, the miracles are a means of confirming the message that the kingdom of God is now being established with power! God is establishing His rule through Christ, and proving it with the miraculous power which and disease. Mark's account takes Jesus from His teaching in parables and follows Him throughout Galilee as He confirms the authority of His teaching with miraculous works. (F. La Gard Smith, The Daily Bible)



Gentile Woman Shows Her Faith

Tyre and Sidon were two cities on the Mediterranean sea coast. They were several miles apart, but they were prominent cities of Phoenicia and were often referred to together as the region of Tyre and Sidon. Sidon is about 25 miles north of Tyre and was the chief city of Phoenicia. It is thought that Sidon was the older of the two cities, but Tyre was the chief seaport.

Even before the time of Christ, the art of glass blowing was discovered in Sidon. Both cities were famous for selling purple dye made from a certain type of shellfish. Many of the famous "cedars of Lebanon" were made into ships or taken in the ships to far away countries. Sidon was about 50 miles from Nazareth.

I Kings 5:1-6 tells us about Hiram, King of Tyre, helping Solomon with the temple and of the ability of the people of Sidon in cutting timber. One interesting thing about Tyre was a prophecy in Ezekiel 26:1-6. The prophet foretold that Tyre would become a place for spreading of nets. At this time it seemed foolish, for Tyre was a great city. But the prophecy was fulfilled and is one of many that help us realized the Bible is inspired of God.






